Statement, findings and recommendations from the indigenous residents and stakeholders of Ngorongoro Conservation Area to decision makers, national and international organizations<sup>1</sup>

On December 4<sup>th</sup> a large meeting was convened by the people of Ngorongoro and they agreed to the following:

We the people of Ngorongoro undersigned hereby declare that we are the rightful inhabitants and stakeholders of the Ngorongoro Conservation Area and we demand to be recognized as the custodians of the enormous cultural and natural values of the area. We have lived with wildlife since time immemorial and will continue to do this. Ngorongoro Conservation Area is a World Heritage Site, it is also a Man and Biosphere Reserve as well as a multiple land use area. It is high time that the local people are duly recognized as the central stakeholder in the area and that peoplecentred conservation and development is implemented in the area.

Below are the findings and recommendations produced by the people of Ngorongoro and presented to the IUCN/UNESCO World Heritage Site monitoring team to Ngorongoro Conservation Area in December 2008. The above statement and the findings and recommendations below are made in full agreement and signed by a large group of representatives of the people of Ngorongoro as serious concerns that need immediate attention.
